Responses to the Coming of Christ: Worship, Indifference, or Hostility

"When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet: "And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel..." After listening to the king, they went on their way. And behold, the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. And going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh...
Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, became furious, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had ascertained from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, weeping and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be comforted, because they are no more." Matthew 2:3-6, 9-11, 16-18

In this passage, we encounter three responses to the advent of Jesus Christ.

	Attitude	Response
*Wise Men (limited knowledge)	Searched diligently, rejoiced with great joy	Worship and gifts
*Chief Priests and Scribes (biblically informed Re: Messiah)	Scholarly, indifference	Non-compelling, no urgency (bland religious interest)
*Herod (begrudgingly aware)	Duplicity and murderous plans	Open hostility and slaughter of infant boys in Bethlehem
