Alone I am not confident, no pride in strength or knowledge or character.





HOW CAN I KEEP FROM SINGING

The text and tune for this popular hymn can be traced back to Rev. Robert Lowry, a Philadelphia-born minister and composer (1826-1899).
Lowry is credited with having written approximately 500 songs, with "How Can I Keep From Singing?" (composed in 1860) becoming one of the most well known.

Similar to the African American spiritual tradition, the themes of hope and perseverance can be found throughout the verses of this hymn.

My life flows on in endless song, above earth's lamentation. I hear the real, though far off hymn, that hails a new creation. Above the tumult and the strife, I hear its music ringing. It sounds a mighty echo in my soul. How can I keep from singing?

HALLELUJAH! By Definition

"Hallelujah," "Hallelujah" and the Latin form "Alleluia" are transliterations of the Hebrew word - meaning "Praise God!"

Hallelujah is found primarily in the book of Psalms. The word is used in Judaism as part of the Hallel prayers, and in Christian prayer. It has been accepted into the English language and has a similar pronunciation in many other languages.


In the Bible the term is used 24 times in the Hebrew Bible (mainly in the book of Psalms, e.g. 111-117, 145-150, where it starts and concludes a number of Psalms) and four times in Greek transliteration in Revelation.

The word hallelujah occurring in Psalms is a Hebrew request for a congregation to join in praise. It can be translated as "Praise Yah, you people", and is usually worded in English contexts as "Praise ye the Lord" or "Praise the Lord".

Hallel in Hebrew means a joyous praise, to boast in God, or to act madly or foolishly. The second part, Yah, is a shortened form of the name of God YHWH, sometimes rendered in English as "Yahweh" or "Jehovah".

For most Christians, "Hallelujah" is considered a joyful word of praise to God, rather than an injunction to praise him. Among many Protestant Christians, the expressions of Hallelujah and Praise the Lord are acceptable, spontaneous expressions of joy thanksgiving and praise towards God, requiring no specific prompting or call or leading times of praise and singing.
