THE POINT OF CREATION

JOHN PIPER

*So God created man in his own image,
in the image of God he created him;
male and female he created them.*
(Genesis 1:27)

God made humans in his image so that the world would be filled with reflectors of God. Images of God. Seven billion statues of God. So that nobody would miss the point of creation.

Nobody (unless they are stone blind) could miss the point of humanity, namely, God — knowing, loving, showing God. The angels cry in Isaiah 6:3, *"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!"* It is full of billions of human image-bearers. Glorious ruins.

But not only humans. Also nature! Why such a breathtaking world for us to live in? Why such a vast universe?

I once read that there are more stars in the universe than there are words and sounds that all humans of all time have ever spoken. Why are there so many? So large? So bright? At such unimaginable distances? The Bible is crystal clear about this: *"The heavens declare the glory of God"* (Psalm 19:1).

If someone asks, "If earth is the only inhabited planet and man the only rational inhabitant among the stars, why such a large and empty universe?" The answer is: It's not about us. It's about God. And it's an understatement. He is more glorious. Greater in power. Greater in scope. Greater brightness. Than all the galaxies combined. One wise man said, the universe is like a peanut that God carries around in his pocket.

God created us to know him and love him and show him. And then he gave us a hint of what he is like: the universe.

THE CHURCH IN COMMUNION WORSHIP

We gather for worship this day to magnify the glory of our Great Creator God, and thank Him for His goodness to us through the celebration of the Lord's Supper.

When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, and the son of man that you care for him? O LORD, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! (Psalm 8:3-9 ESV)

REFLECTION

THOUGHTS FOR WORSHIP PREPARATION

God takes pleasure in his creation. Genesis 1 describes for us not only the fact of an ordered creation by God, but also God's response to his creation. Five times, you recall, God stands back, as it were, and takes stock of his creation. Each time the text says, "And God saw that it was good" (vv. 4, 12, 18, 21, 25). And when all was finished and man and woman were created in his own image, it says, "And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good." I take this to mean that God was delighted with his work. When he looked at it, it gave him pleasure. He was pleased and happy with his creative effort.

I have been picking up little things in Scripture that show God's intimate involvement in creation. For example, in 1 Corinthians 15:38 Paul is comparing how a seed is planted in one form and comes forth in another form with a "body" different from all other bodies. He says, "God gives it a body just as he wished, and to each of the seeds a body of its own." This is a remarkable statement of God's involvement in the way God designed each seed to bring forth its own unique plant (not just species but each individual seed!). Paul is not teaching about evolution here, but he is showing how he takes God's intimate involvement with creation for granted. He cannot imagine, evidently, that any natural process should be conceived without God's doing it.

Again in Psalm 94:9 it says, "He who planted the ear, does he not hear? He who formed the eye, does he not see?" The psalmist assumes that God was the designer of the eye and that he designed the way the ear is planted in the head to do its hearing work. So when we marvel at the wonders of the human eye and the remarkable structure of the ear, we are not to marvel at the processes of chance but at the mind and the creativity of God.

Similarly in Psalm 95:5, "The sea is his for he made it; and his hands formed the dry land." The involvement of God in making land and sea is such that the present sea is his. It is not as though he in some impersonal way set it all in motion a billion years ago. Rather he is the one who owns it because he made it. It is today his handiwork and bears the marks of his creator claim on it, like a piece of artwork belongs to the one who painted it until he sells it or gives it away.

I point out these things to call you to be God-centered in your admiration of the wonders of the world. God decided what the Iris beside our fence should look like this week when it came to flower. God means for the beauty of that plant (not just that kind of plant)—that very plant to be an occasion for our worshipping his specific creativity.

CREATION AND PROVIDENCE

Once we understand that God is the all-powerful Creator, it seems reasonable to conclude that he also preserves and governs everything in the universe as well.

The term providence has been traditionally used to summarize God's ongoing relationship to his creation.

When we accept the biblical doctrine of providence, we avoid four common errors in thinking about God's relationship to creation: The biblical doctrine is not deism (which teaches that God created the world and then essentially abandoned it); nor pantheism (which teaches that the creation does not have a real, distinct existence in itself, but is only part of God); but providence which teaches that though God is actively related to and involved in the creation at each moment, creation is distinct from him.

Moreover, the biblical doctrine does not teach that events in creation are determined by chance (or randomness), nor are they determined by impersonal fate (or determinism), but by God, who is the personal yet infinitely powerful Creator and Lord.

We may define God's providence as follows: God is continually involved with all created things in such a way that he (1) keeps them existing and maintaining the properties with which he created them; (2) cooperates with created things in every action, directing their distinctive properties to cause them to act as they do; and (3) directs them to fulfill his purposes.

Who has known the mind of God?


I set this Scripture to a new tune I wrote that hopefully brings out the strength of the text in a new way.
